

# Mishkenot Sha'ananim

The first neighborhood built outside of the Old City walls. After it was built, other neighborhoods were also built outside of the walls.

The neighborhood was built because inside the walls of the Old City it was very crowded

Moses Montefiore built the neighborhood

People were scared of moving to the neighborhood, and whoever lived there was seen as very brave and unafraid of doing new things

A flour mill was set up in the neighborhood so that the people living there could work there

# Armon Hanatziv

The neighborhood was named after an old English building in the neighborhood

Before it was called Armon Hanatziv, the neighborhood was called East Talpiyot

There are special, unique sculptures in the neighborhood

There is a beautiful promenade (a long walking path) in the neighborhood from which there is a gorgeous view of the Old City

The people who live in the neighborhood are new immigrants who dreamed of living in Jerusalem

# Meah Shearim

It was built by a group of 100 people

It is a very traditional neighborhood, and most of the people who live there keep the Torah very strictly.

The neighborhood is named after the pasuk in Bereishit that translates to mean, "Yitzchak sowed in the land, and in that year, he reaped a hundredfold (Meah Shearim=a hundredfold=a hundred times over)..."

The houses in the neighborhood used to make up a long wall and that was to make the neighborhood safer. In the middle of the neighborhood was a big yard. The neighborhood in the Old City also used to be like that.

# Rechavia

The first house in the neighborhood belonged to Eliezer and Thelma Yellin

Rechavia is a garden neighborhood that has gardens and open spaces to walk along, together with the houses

The first people living in the neighborhood were from wealthy Sephardic families and this meant that they influenced the street names in the neighborhood

Among the people living in the neighborhood were, and still are, leaders and well-respected people of the New Yishuv

In the neighborhood there are national buildings of Israel.
